Overview of Residency Training Programs

This document provides general information relating to residency programs operated by the WashU/BJH/SLCH Graduate Medical Education (GME) Consortium and the policies applicable to those programs. ➤ Residency Appointments

The primary purpose of residency training programs is educational. Residents will be expected to perform duties assigned by their program so that their progress in core competencies can be reliably evaluated. See [GMEC Operating Principles, section XII](#).

Residents serve on an at will basis, with continued participation in the program dependent on acceptable performance and conduct. Decisions regarding progression to the next training level will be determined annually by the Program Director. See [GMEC Operating Principles, section XIII](#). Reviews of formal adverse disciplinary decisions involving dismissal from or performance-based extension of the residency program are conducted in accordance with [GMEC Operations Principles, section XVI](#).

Moonlighting is not permitted without the express written authorization of the Program Director and the GME office. For more information about moonlighting and duty hours, see [GMEC Operating Principles, section XXII](#).

➤ Financial Support and Benefits

Salaries for the academic year are determined annually and are posted on the [GMC website](#). All residents are paid a baseline salary dependent on their post-graduate year. Payments are made bi-weekly.

Residents are offered a comprehensive benefits package, including medical and prescription drugs, vision, dental, life insurance, flexible spending accounts, long-term disability (LTD) coverage, and legal services. Medical (including prescription drugs) coverage will begin on your hire date. All other coverage will begin on the first day of the month after your hire date, provided you complete your online enrollment within 31 days of your hire date. Residents will automatically be enrolled for LTD coverage, unless proof of other coverage is provided within 31 days of your hire date. For details, please see <https://bjcprod.service-now.com/esc>

Residents also are eligible for a variety of paid time off and leaves of absence, which are detailed in the [GME Consortium Vacation and Leave of Absence Policy](#) and associated [FAQs](#). Because residents must meet certain education requirements established by the training program, ACGME and/or the applicable American Board of Medical Specialties, they may be required to make up time missed due to a leave prior to advancing to the next level of training and/or completing the program.

Residents are provided indemnification and defense of medical professional liability claims arising from clinical activities within the course and scope of their residency training program approved by their department heads. Coverage is managed on an occurrence basis, which precludes the need for extended reporting (“tail coverage”) after completion of the program.
